W. Eugene Ferguson

A memorial service for W. Eugene Ferguson of 36 Forest street will be conducted Friday, at 3 p.m., in the Wellesley Hills Congregational Church. Dr. Ferguson, 60, chairman of the mathematics department at Newton North High School, died Sunday evening in an automobile accident in Pennsylvania.

He had been involved in education for 40 years beginning in 1934 as teacher-principal of The Ward School in Purdy, Missouri, and including posts at Yale University and Connecticut College for Women. He came to Newton in 1955 as Head of the mathematics department. In addition to this responsibility, Dr. Ferguson served on numerous committees throughout the country and authored considerable material to update the mathematics curriculum. He insisted that "everyone should know some mathematics."

During the period from 1956 to the present, Dr. Ferguson travelled extensively throughout this country and the world lecturing and helping others to establish a secondary school mathematics program. He served as president of The New England Association of Mathematics Teachers and chairman of the Committee on Advanced Placement Mathematics.

Charles E. Brown, 54 former Newton school head

Charles E. Brown, 54, who served as superintendent of Newton public schools for eight years in the 1960s, died at his home yesterday on Highland avenue, Newtonville.

Dr. Brown was born in Bethany, Conn., one of 11 children. He served in the Army during World War II in the South Pacific.

He was a graduate of Springfield College and held a master's degree as well as a doctorate from Harvard University.

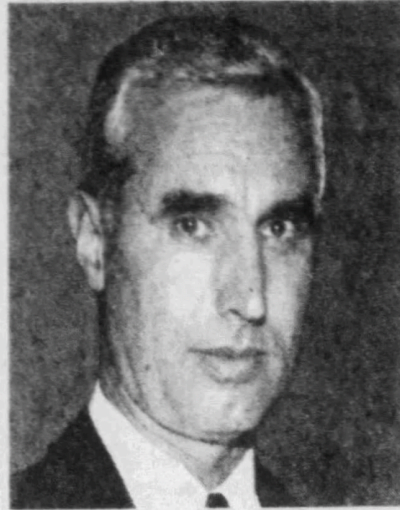
In 1954, he came to Newton as a science teacher at Day Junior High School and, during the next few years, served as administrative assistant to the superintendent and as assistant superintendent in charge of personnel.

In 1960, at age 35, Dr. Brown was appointed superintendent of the Newton school system and he served until 1968 in that capacity.

From 1968-71, Dr. Brown was program officer with the Ford Foundation and subsequently was director of the Center for Educational Leadership sponsored by the foundation.

Since 1972, he had been on the staff of the Education Development Center and had been active as a consultant to school systems and school boards on personnel and administrative matters.

Among his affiliations in community and educational affairs, Dr. Brown was a member of the board of directors at METCO, a member of the White House Conference on Education, a member of the Carnegie Commission on the Education of Educators and a consultant to the

US Office of Education and to the Danforth Foundation.

He had served as a member of the board at Newton Junior College and of Milton Academy. He was also a trustee of the Perpetual Benevolent Fund of Newton and the board of the Church Society for College Work.

He was also a member of the Second Church in Newton. Dr. Brown leaves his wife, Nancy Lewis, and four children: Sarah Max of Southington, Conn., and Douglas, Elizabeth and Jonathan of Newton. He is also survived by four brothers and five sisters.

A memorial service will be held Saturday, at 2 p.m. at the Second Church, 60 Highland st., West Newton.

Born in Boston, Mr. Gradone graduated from Salem State College and served in the Army Signal Corps during World War II before earning a master's degree at Boston University.

He was an administrative assistant, business education teacher and chairman of the business department at Newton North High School as well as housemaster of Palmer House at Newton North High School from 1961 to 1978. He retired in 1989.

He was the former president of the Newton Teachers Credit Union.

David Montgomery Wells - Everything I Learned About Buying and Renovating Buildings I Learned from Monty Wells by Laurie D. T. Mann

Back in the early '80s, Jim and I moved to Boston and became very active in NESFA and MCFI. One of the major tasks NESFA members undertook in those days was to look for a clubhouse. We looked at old houses and old storefronts all over the Boston area.

One of the leaders of this search was a newcomer to NESFA named Monty Wells. Monty was a teacher at a local high school with a teenaged daughter. We soon discovered that among Monty's talents was that he knew everything - and I mean everything - about carpentry, building codes and how to decide if the building you're looking at is right for you.

Monty often got "first looks" at various buildings, since he was interested and really understood buildings. He could evaluate a building with an agent to figure out if it was worthwhile getting other folks in the club to look at it. I particularly remember a building that had been an old theater off Watertown that we went to see several times. Monty explained what was going on with the wiring, the floor boards, even the fire escape. I think Monty might have been looking forward to the challenge of turning an old theater into the NESFA clubhouse. But we finally decided the theater wasn't quite right for us, so we went on with the search.

Finally, after years of prowling the classified ads of the Boston Globe, we found an old dry cleaner's in Somerville. The price was definitely right, but it did require an awful lot of work. Monty led us through the joys of ripping out floor-to-ceiling cleaning machines. Not to mention finding the 6' long piece of equipment that later had a life after the dry cleaners. Monty created a suitable resting place for the equipment that withstood quite a few adventures over the years...;->

Monty was very happy with tools, from the basic sledgehammer to the latest circular saw. He probably used every piece he owned and many he borrowed to help get the clubhouse habitable. He showed us how to rip down walls, put up new ones, level floors and put new flooring down.

Monty was not a traveling fan, but he did work on Boskones and Noreascons and Arisias. He worked with Chip Hitchcock to create the "tinker toy" art show setup. He was often one of the first to load the logistics truck and one of the last to leave after it was all unloaded.

Monty Wells, hard at work, surrounded by dust as usual as he carefully removes part of the wall between our light and airy dining room and our cave-like kitchen, 1988 Leslie Mann (not Monty Wells) after we finished the post-wall demolition clean-up, 1988 In addition to all his work for the club, you could always get Monty to help out with other projects. Many of us bought houses back in the '80s, and Monty's expertise helped all of us. The fact that I'd followed him on a dozen house tours before we started looking for a house on our own meant I knew what questions to ask and why a solid steel main beam was such a good thing to have. You could also hire Monty to do summertime renovations; he turned our cave-like kitchen a bit lighter by knocking down some of the wall between the dining room and the kitchen (these before and after photos were taken in the summer of 1988). The last thing he did for us was to rebuild our dining room steps before we moved to Pittsburgh.

We haven't seen Monty too much over the last few years, other than our annual trip up to Boskone. We had heard from friends that he'd developed cancer, so when we saw him at this year's Boskone, he was gaunt and tired. But his mind was still quite lively, and it was a real pleasure to see him again.

Unfortunately, Monty died of cancer on April 15, 1998. The tax man cometh...

Richard W. Mechem, 82, former Newton principal

Richard W. Mechem, 82, a former principal of Newton High School, died Dec. 14 at his home in Gloucester.

Mr. Mechem was principal of Newton High School, now Newton North, for 22 years until his retirement in 1982.

Mr. Mechem was an Evanston, Ill., native. He graduated from St. Paul's School in Concord, N.H., where he later taught. His education at Harvard College was expedited so he could serve in the Navy during World War II. After serving on a destroyer in the South Pacific, he graduated with the Harvard class of 1945 and returned to St. Paul's. He taught there 11 years.

He was then principal of Walnut Hills High School in Cincinnati for three years before becoming principal of Newton High.

"My change from private to public school work is symbolic of my social views," Mr. Mechem wrote in the 25th anniversary report of his class at Harvard. "The current generation looks at me as a tired representative of the establishment, and it seems to be of little help that I had many of their ideas 25 years ago."

He wrote that he never trusted the capitalist system and worried about the establishment view of war in 1942. "Poverty amidst affluence, cutthroat business practices by churchgoing citizens, the obvious artificiality of a Wall Street-based economy, the arrogance of privatism [including, alas, Harvard and St. Paul's], are but a few of the sociological factors which caused me to move first into education, and then into public education," he wrote.

Mr. Mechem was also a trustee of the Judge Baker Children's Center in Boston.

"He was only 22 years older than me, and so he had a very close relationship with all of my peers," his son, R. Thompson of Gloucester, said yesterday, noting that his friends and his father shared a love of sailing, tennis, and hockey. "It's been interesting since his passing to hear all of my contemporaries talk about how close a relationship they had with him, both as a mentor and competitor."

In addition to his son, Mr. Mechem leaves his wife, Gilda Levine Mechem; a daughter, Ann Ziergiebel of Gloucester; another son, George W. of Lexington; four stepdaughters, Raida Goldman and Roberta Phillips, both of Florida, Marjorie Ritvo of Vermont, and Diane Gardener of Newton; a sister, Barbara Smith of Gloucester; 16 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at 1 p.m. Jan. 8 in Annisquam Village Church in Gloucester.

Robert Zeeb Retired Newton educator, 71, dies after cycling crash

At 71 years old, retired Newton educator Robert Zeeb wasn't slowing down.

Zeeb was training to ride his bicycle across the country. Every other day, Zeeb would ride his bicycle 60 miles in trips that took him from Newton to Concord, Sudbury, Weston, or Boston, and he was pushing himself to ride farther in preparation for his coast-to-coast ride in June.

"He figured he was going to have to go about 80 miles a day," said Zeeb's son, Noel. "It was about the act itself, for him. He wasn't a racer."

But on Monday, during a ride to Arlington, Robert Zeeb crashed his bicycle along Route 2. He died from his injuries the following day.

Witnesses told State Police that Zeeb crashed along the westbound side of Route 2, east of Exit 60, at 10:22 a.m. -not far from the Alewife T station. A witness told police that it appeared as if Zeeb's bicycle struck a hole for an electrical box in the ground and that no other vehicles were involved in the accident.

Zeeb's family is upset the hole wasn't covered and is looking for answers. "I'm going to need to talk to them to see why that [cover] wasn't there," Noel Zeeb said yesterday.

One witness told State Police the hole was filled with leaves and its cover was several feet away, said David Procopio, a State Police spokesman.

The area in which Zeeb crashed is a partially paved sidewalk beside Route 2. It falls under the jurisdiction of the state Highway Department, now a division of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation, which responded to the scene and replaced the cover for the electrical box, Procopio said.

Adam Hurtubise, a spokesman for the state Department of Transportation, declined to comment yesterday because of the ongoing police investigation into the accident.

After the accident, two witnesses, whose names have not been released, were driving west along Route 2 and pulled over to try to help. Zeeb, who had been wearing a helmet, appeared to have head injuries and was taken to Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Procopio said.

For now, Zeeb's family is more focused on remembering his life than on the details of his death, Noel Zeeb said.

In addition to being an avid cyclist for most of his life, Robert Zeeb worked for 39 years for Newton public schools as coordinator for the district's English program.

He lived in Newton with his wife, Holly, whom he'd met as an undergraduate at Harvard. The couple had two sons, Peter, 46, who lives in Arlington, and Noel, 43, of Cambridge.

Zeeb was also heavily involved with Green Decade, a nonprofit environmental group in Newton, and was an active member of First Unitarian Society of Newton.

"He was a very big part of the community in Newton," Noel Zeeb said. "He was a larger-than-life type of character."

Edward Martin, who befriended Robert Zeeb while working with him as a teacher and later as a curriculum coordinator in the Newton school system, said Zeeb was always coming up with new teaching ideas and there was never a dull moment with him.

“Some of us are, when we get older, boring,” Martin said. “He never got boring.”

Peter Smith, a board member of Green Decade, said Smith had worked on a number of environmental projects for the nonprofit over the years.

One of Zeeb’s latest efforts was Household EcoTeam, a competition that groups households into teams that support and challenge one another to make their homes more environmentally friendly.

Louise Bruyn, a former president of Green Decade, said one of the nonprofit’s main efforts has been to cut down on carbon emissions. Bruyn said Zeeb was one of many workers with Green Decade who preferred to ride a bicycle because it doesn’t pollute.

“What a horrible accident,” Bruyn said. “He was a very special person.”

Noel Zeeb said his father was an “extreme extrovert” who loved sharing his ideas about everything from books to politics. Robert Zeeb also chaired an adult education committee at First Unitarian Society.

“He was just always engaged with the world,” Noel Zeeb said.

Peter Zeeb said his father was also an avid gardener who grew about 2,000 heads of garlic a year.

Noel Zeeb said his father was very careful on his bicycle and always wore a helmet. But Noel Zeeb said he doesn’t think his father saw any danger ahead on his ride Monday.

“He had no idea,” he said. “He didn’t do anything wrong.”

A memorial service is scheduled for Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. in First Unitarian Society in Newton.

Richard Batchelder

When National Education Association members met in Washington, D.C., to celebrate the 40-year anniversary of integrating the nation's teachers unions, they gave a standing ovation to Richard Batchelder.

He was the NEA's president in 1966 when two unions, one representing white teachers and one for African-American teachers, combined to form one organization, whose membership now exceeds 3 million.

“We became a different organization because of him and we will never go back,” said Dennis Van Roekel, the NEA’s current president. “It was such a powerful moment in our history and it was a testimony to Richard Batchelder’s tenacity and his commitment to social justice.”

Mr. Batchelder, who remained active in education issues after retiring to Cape Cod, died of Parkinson’s disease Feb. 26 in his Chatham home. He was 87.

Known to friends and colleagues as Batch, Mr. Batchelder also was credited with helping shift the NEA from being led mainly by administrators and higher-education professionals to an organization led by teachers.

During his tenure, the NEA merged with the American Teachers Association, which represented African-American educators. At the time, presidents served one-year terms, which offered little time for sweeping changes.

“It was 1966, and we were in the midst of the civil rights movement,” Van Roekel said. “This was not an easy transition. Not everyone thought it was the best idea. But Batch stepped up and led, and people believed in him. He was articulate and bright, and his message grabbed people.”

Mr. Batchelder’s views on segregation formed while he served in the Navy during World War II, said his son, Richard Jr. of Weston.

“When he saw the segregated troops, that had a profound impact on him,” his son said. “He had a very strong moral compass. He was such a good role model.”

Born in Canton, Richard David Batchelder was the oldest child of Nelson Batchelder and the former Marjorie Curra.

He graduated from Canton High School in 1942, enrolled in Northeastern University, and decided to enlist in the Navy after seeing the Noel Coward film “In Which We Serve.” When his father heard about the decision, he enlisted, too, and both were stationed in the South Pacific.

Mr. Batchelder was an aviation radio operator and returned home after World War II to attend Boston University on the GI Bill, graduating in 1949. He took a job at Chatham High School, where he taught five subjects, including math and history.

In 1952, he graduated with a master’s in education from what is now Bridgewater State University, but his teaching salary was so low he worked two extra jobs.

“I don’t think he had planned to get involved in the teacher’s movement,” his son said, “but he starting thinking, ‘What can I do to improve this situation?’ He thought that teachers were too important to children and to the community to have to work second or third jobs.”

Mr. Batchelder helped negotiate better pay for teachers and soon was appointed president of the union representing Chatham educators. In that capacity he welcomed Martha Cook, a physical education teacher, to Chatham High School. They married in 1955.

“A framed letter still hangs on the wall of their house,” said their daughter Anne of Chatham. “It’s from my Dad, welcoming Miss Cook to her new job.”

In 1957, the couple moved to Newton, where Mr. Batchelder taught at Newton High School and became involved in the state branch of the NEA. At 34, he was head of the organization’s department of classroom teachers.

About that time he became interested in working on the national level to combine the NEA with the American Teachers Association. He was only 40 when he became the NEA’s national president.

Al-Tony Gilmore, NEA archivist emeritus, called Mr. Batchelder “one of the chief architects of the modern NEA” and said he was “a visionary, a strong proponent for equity and social justice in the NEA, when those terms did not resonate with the American public to the extent they do today.”

Noting that NEA membership surpassed 1 million during Mr. Batchelder’s presidency, Gilmore said that “during the racially volatile and contentious era of the 1960s, Batchelder earned the trust and confidence of NEA progressives and the leadership of the American Teachers Association.”

After his term as president ended, Mr. Batchelder moved his family to California for six years, then Florida for eight years, serving as a leader of each state’s organization of teachers.

In 1981, he returned to Massachusetts. For three years he led the Labor Education Center at what is now the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth before retiring with his wife to Chatham, where the family had vacationed for years.

“I don’t know if you could call Batch ‘retired,’” said Dougie Bohman, who formerly served on the Chatham Board of Selectmen.

Bohman noted that Mr. Batchelder chaired the Chatham School Committee, was involved in numerous community organizations, and participated in Town Meeting.

“He earned a very fine reputation,” Bohman said. “He formed his opinions and stuck by them, but he was always polite and nice, and you never saw him lose his cool.”

Vida Gavin, a former Chatham schools superintendent who worked with Mr. Batchelder when he headed the School Committee, said he was a “true educator” who persuaded the town to renovate school buildings.

“With every decision he made, he considered the children first,” she said. “They were always number one. He was an outstanding leader and he will be greatly missed.”

In 2005, the town named Mr. Batchelder grand marshal of its Fourth of July Parade.

Mr. Batchelder also served as president of the Chatham Drama Guild and had acted in many plays in the 1950s.

“My father’s love of the theater, especially musical theater, was a hallmark of our family life,” his daughter said. “He passed it along to each of us.”

Even when he was ill, he attended each production at the Monomoy Theatre in Chatham.

An avid sailor, Mr. Batchelder helped found the Friends of Chatham Waterways and received its Captain’s Award in 2008.

A service has been held for Mr. Batchelder, who in addition to his wife, son, and daughter leaves another daughter, Amy Harris of Silver Spring, Md.; a brother, Nelson of Canton; and five grandchildren.

“He was a mediator and a conciliator, in his personal life as much as in his professional life,” Anne said. “He was always available to us, and he was always able to make things turn out better than they would have without him.”

Alan Gartner, a civil rights activist who served as a top advisor in the Bloomberg administration, died July 14, 2015. He was 80 and graduated with a BA in History from Antioch College in 1956. His children include Rachel B. Gartner '83. Alan served as an Antioch College Trustee 1974-75.

The cause of death was Parkinson's disease, a family friend said.

Known as a man who worked behind-the-scenes to fight against inequality, Gartner was once beaten by segregationists during a protest in Louisiana and held a top position a major civil rights organization during the 1960s.

"He was a true giant as far as civil rights were concerned," said former Deputy Mayor and schools chancellor Dennis Walcott of his old chief of staff.

In 1965, Gartner, who was studying at Harvard, traveled to Bogalusa, La., for a protest where he was attacked by racists. He suffered cuts, bruises and broken glasses.

At the time, Gartner was serving as the national community relations director for the Congress of Racial Equality, a leading civil rights group in the 1960s.

He left CORE and worked in several antipoverty organizations in Suffolk County and New York. Eventually, he started to work as an education scholar at the Graduate Center at the City University of New York where he earned a doctorate in urban education.

As an academic, he wrote or edited more than 25 books, including "Inclusion and School Reform: Transforming America's Classrooms."

In the late 1970s, he served as the director for special education, a cause he long championed.

Before the 2001 mayoral election, he served as an education policy advisor to Bloomberg. After the election, he became Walcott's chief of staff.

"Like many CUNY students, I was lucky to have him as a teacher, and he became an invaluable part of our City Hall team and the education reforms that made such a big difference in the lives of millions of children," Bloomberg said.

Gartner is survived by his wife Dorothy, six children, and 11 grandchildren.

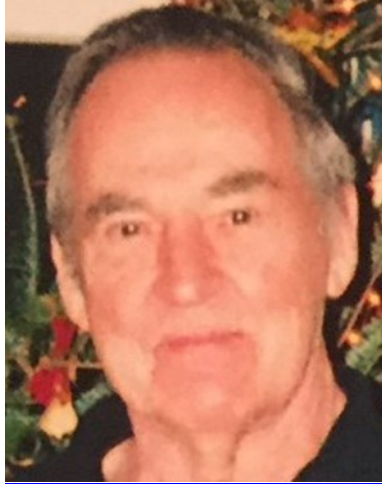

Susan P. Bloom, an educator beloved by legions of former students who became successful writers, editors, teachers, and book advocates, and who spent her working life spreading the gospel of children's books, passed away peacefully at her home in Framingham on June 7, 2019. The cause was ovarian cancer. She was 80 years old.

Susan was born in Boston on November 29, 1938, the second daughter of a salesman and a seamstress. Her parents, Benjamin Parker and Lillian (Pinksohn) Parker, raised her in Brookline. Susan was twelve when her father died, but her mother made many of Susan and her sister Lois' clothes, and her deft way with a needle and thread supported the family.

She attended Brookline High and received a BA in English from Simmons College (now University) in 1960. Susan began her career teaching English at Newton North High School, where she supervised student teachers from Simmons for many years. On August 29, 1965, Susan married David Bloom at Longwood Towers in Brookline. David was fond of saying "My life began when I met Susy," and they shared that life for almost 52 years. They settled in Wellesley in 1966, where they lived for 40 years, and where they raised their cherished daughter Johanna, who entered the world in 1971. In 2013, Susan and David happily moved into an in-law suite in a home that Johanna and her husband purchased in Framingham.

Susan eventually returned to Simmons College and obtained a master's degree in Children's Literature. Soon after, she was hired to teach in the Simmons English Department's freshman writing program. In 1986 she became the Director of Center for the Study of Children's Literature and the Children's Literature Graduate Program. During her time as an Assistant Professor and subsequently, as Associate Professor, the Master of Fine Arts in Children's Literature was created, she served on The Horn Book review staff, was twice chair of the Boston Globe–Horn Book Awards, and twice served on the prestigious Newbery Award committee. She was also an annual lecturer at the Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art in Amherst, MA. With co-author Cathie Mercier, Susan wrote biocritical studies of the writers Avi, Russell Freedman, and Zibby Oneal. Cathie, current director of the Center and the graduate degree programs, praised Susan's visionary stewardship of the nation's first graduate degree programs in children's literature. "Susan's reputation as a critic and as a creative spirit fortified the University's status as a leader in children's literature," Cathie said.

When she retired from Simmons as Associate Professor Emerita, Susan's family, friends, and alumni established the Susan P. Bloom fund to support the Center's distinctive institutes and advocacy work. Also in her honor, the PEN New England Children's Book Caucus founded the Susan P. Bloom Children's Book Discovery Award, which acknowledges emerging writers and writer/illustrators in the field.

Susan's accomplishments are myriad, but the words of her former students best convey her deep love of teaching and learning. Megan Lambert, a current lecturer in the children's literature graduate program, notes that the poet Mary Oliver writes "To pay attention, this is our endless and proper work." "Susan," Megan said, "was a model of attentiveness to her students...her irrepressible sense of delight in learning inspired us to pay attention to the books we read...it's been two decades since I took a class with Susan Bloom, but I've never stopped learning from her." And Susan Rich, a lauded editor for Little, Brown Books for Young Readers, noted that "Susan taught me to look at literature deeply and with an open heart...her pride in my books has been a vital measure of my work." The author Jo Knowles borrowed imagery from E.B. White's classic *Charlotte's Web*, in saying that "Susan was Charlotte to all of us Wilburs, so unsure of what we were capable of...Show me how you are TERRIFIC, Susan said. We will carry her radiance in our hearts."

Writers and illustrators throughout the field also fell under Susan's spell. Newbery Award-winning author Lois Lowry noted that "It's TOUGH (capitals hers) to find someone who didn't appreciate Susan." Author/illustrator David Macaulay, winner of the Caldecott Medal and many other accolades, said "the depth of her enthusiasm for teaching and learning was absolutely contagious...when she visited my studio with her classes, she always managed to wring the best out of me, determined to connect the finished books with their creator." Author Jack Gantos, also a Newbery Award recipient, noted "Heart and soul, brains and lots of purple...Susan was singular." And Jacqueline Woodson, an award-winning author named National Ambassador for Young People's Literature, reacted to Susan's loss with these words: "I adore that woman beyond and beyond and am SO (capitals hers) not ready for her to become an ancestor! She is the truth, that woman."

Susan was a noticeable presence everywhere she went, with her closely-cropped curls, a propensity for wearing purple, and her iconic jangly, dangly earrings. Children's books were Susan's vocation and avocation, but her milieu was the world. "I always considered her an omnivore of life," said Carolyn Shute, a former student, colleague, and friend. "She was curious and curiouser about everything and always open to new ideas. Susan ate the world." She was an inveterate theater-goer, holding subscriptions to the ART, Huntington, Trinity, and the Gamm. She loved to support local theater, but traveled frequently to productions in New York City. Seeing *Hamilton* with its original cast was a recent highlight. Museums, dance, lectures, great literature, gardening, must-see TV, National Public Radio: she was interested in them all. Politics, too. She never shied away from respectfully voicing her strongly-held opinions, whether it was among friends, knocking on doors for national elections, or talking to someone in line at a grocery store. Her charm could sometimes even change minds.

A superb cook, Susan loved interesting and artful food, and took great pleasure in entertaining. Her celebrations were always executed in minute detail. She was known in her family for legendary and inspired Thanksgivings, always anchored by a theme connected with a particular American anniversary. They included the 150th anniversary of the Gettysburg Address (for which she created Lincoln's head in bread), the 100th anniversary of the FBI, Julia Child's 90th birthday, and the centennial of the National Parks Service. Playful, pre-dinner activities like making stovepipe hats were *de rigueur*; place settings included printed menus that cleverly riffed on the theme.

Joy existed everywhere for Susan; so many things were worthy of celebration. She had a small collection of orchids and lilies and other semi-exotic things growing in pots. But her favorite was *Selenicereus grandiflorus*: “Queen of the Night.” Once a year this spindly night-blooming cereus would open its petals for a single summer night. Its large, creamy blooms saturated a room with their heady scent. When its buds were full and well-rounded, Susan put friends and neighbors on notice. “Come tonight,” she’d say, excitedly. The group attending the flowering varied, but what didn’t vary was the champagne and the poetry celebrating the one-night wonder.

Susan’s highly-developed sense of whimsy showed up in other arenas, too. When Anthony Browne, the British author/illustrator known for his stories featuring gorillas and chimps, crossed the pond to make a presentation at a Simmons symposium, Susan went to pick him up at the airport dressed as an ape in a rental costume. No one batted an eye. But Browne made a beeline for Susan. You must my ride, she recalled him saying with a twinkle in his eye.

After being diagnosed with ovarian cancer in 2013, Susan decided to take grandsons Jacob and Ben on a legacy trip. Accompanied by nephew Danny, they went on an African safari—the thrill of a lifetime, according to Susan. But in the following years, the foursome experienced more lifetime thrills, traveling to the Galapagos, Costa Rica, and Alaska. Last summer, they visited the Grand Canyon. All of the trips were full of wonderment, and especially wonderful because she was traveling with the grandsons she adored.

As Jacob said of his grandmother, “Traveling with Gamin was the best. She was never about sitting down. She was always about exploring and seeing new things.”

Susan was preceded in death by her parents, her husband David Bloom and her sister Lois (Parker) Glick.

She leaves behind those she considered her greatest blessings in life: her best-beloved daughter Johanna (Bloom) Morse, esteemed son-in-law Bobby Morse, and her three treasured grandchildren, Jacob, 13; Benjamin 11; and Lily, 6, to whom Susan was “Gamin,” not grandma. She also leaves behind her brother-in-law Irving Glick, niece Lisa Glick, and nephew Danny Glick. Susan’s circle of friends and extended family will dearly miss her intelligent, serene, and celebratory spirit.

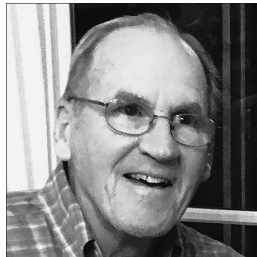

Peter Cobb started conducting in junior high in Newton, MA. “My band conductor let me conduct and I got the bug!” he says. He became student conductor for the band at Harvard, graduated with dual degrees in Music and Teaching, and was the assistant conductor in graduate school. Peter worked his way up to Newton North High School as Director of Secondary School Band. “It was really exciting, and exhausting.” Years later, he “took a wrong turn” into school administration and became an assistant principal in the Midwest, afterwards transitioning into a project for gifted kids at The University of Chicago. Sharon was head of one of the centers—they got involved professionally, then personally. They decided they’d pack everything into a truck and move towards Cape Cod via 26 years in Connecticut.

In Wethersfield, CT, Peter taught more gifted children. He retired in 2002, and tried out for the conductor spot for Harwich Town Band. Peter took over the band in 2005, as a package deal with his wife, Sharon. During the tryouts, Peter saw Cynthia McGalliard playing both cymbals and bass drum. Cynthia actually wanted to play bells; Peter realized his wife wanted to play bass drum. Someone else picked up the cymbal; Cynthia played the bells, and Sharon got the bass.

Cobb likes each percussionist to stay within their strong suit and stay in that area, rather than move the percussionists around. “After Peter applied for the job, he said to me, ‘and by-the-way, you’re going to play bass drum. It’s been the dream of my lifetime, for me to be conductor and you to play the drum,’” says Sharon Cobb, adding, “I never knew Peter had this secret dream. I hadn’t played drums since high school.”

In a small, rural town in 1952 Illinois, Sharon Cobb wanted to play drums. She was told, “Girls can’t play drums. What’s your second choice?” Sharon replied, “It’s drums or nothing.” In fourth grade, she began studying percussion. The town had 5,000 people and the band director was excellent, “a real marching band,” says Sharon, who played snare drum.

Rosamond (“Ros”) Dunford was in an all-girls fife, drum and bugle corps in school. In 1946, there was quite a few all-girl corps. She went into nurse’s training, an intense program back then, and was on-duty or in class most of the time. “I never thought I’d play the drum again,” she says, never having read drum music in the drum corps. Ros became one of the earliest members of Harwich Band, started in the 1970s, and is now head of the percussion section. “She’s wonderful—she keeps us all coordinated. We always know what the other is doing!” says Sharon.

Ros replies, “I don’t have to be boss. We all do our own part. We do have to divide the parts—bell, tambourine, triangle and drum. It’s a matter of dividing up the parts among us. I’m not a musician; I just play the drums!” she jokes. “The people in the section are wonderful to be with. It’s a very relaxing time to be with them. You come away, always, feeling great. They’re an uplifting crew. It’s a lot of fun.” She adds, “I learned to read music in the Harwich Band. It was a surprise! And a challenge.”

Janet Gauland, a seasoned musician, started piano at five years of age, and has been playing ever since. She began playing percussion only five years ago. “I’ve learned so much from Cindy, Sharon

and Ros!” Cynthia McGalliard is the band secretary and plays bells. Her father, Wendell Bassett started the Harwich Band in 1975. Longtime piano player, Dorothy (“Dottie”) Hemmings Bassett plays bells for Harwich Band, and she married Cynthia’s cousin this past August 9!

“We enjoy the time we’re together,” Sharon says of the percussion section. It takes something to keep the beat clean & even. Most bass drummers just hit the drum. I have a way of making the drum become a part of myself, from being a tap dancer.”

The band is sponsored and funded by the Town of Harwich Recreation and Youth Department. One warm evening in August, they opened with The Star Spangled Banner, and then played a premiere performance selection called Carpathia, named after the boat that rescued the survivors of the Titanic. The bass drum and percussion players were featured prominently, and spot-on! The band played a mixture of classical, pop/rock and swing, including a dazzling version of Queen’s Bohemian Rhapsody.

At 7:30, it was time for the “march-around,” where kids of all ages donned hats--stars & striped hats, veiled hats, shark hats, hats with propellers, and marched around the band gazebo in a parade. Adults wore silly hats and joined the kids, and even a big, white dog joined in the fun, while the audience clapped in time to the beat. Next up was Tuxedo Junction, followed by a beautiful Cole Porter Overture, featuring Night and Day, What is This Thing Called Love, and You Do Something to Me.

There were approximately 100 people in attendance, and the concert proceeded with Dvorzak’s Slovenic Dance #8, and a medley called Henry Mancini at The Oscars. People felt free to dance near their lawn seats. Fathers danced with their toddlers, moms swayed with infants, and folks tapped their feet in appreciation for the eclectic, spirited Harwich Band.

The band is in the parade for the Cranberry Festival this Saturday at twelve noon. “The people like it, and are very excited about the festival.” Next up for the band is Tuesday, December 11 for their annual Christmas Concert.

The summer I graduated from college (1965), I began the Master of Arts in Teaching program at the Harvard Ed School, specializing in social studies, in which field Massachusetts certified me as a secondary teacher. After a hasty summer of practice teaching, I was placed at Newton High School as a full-time intern teacher for the 1965–6 school year. Despite my previous tutoring, camp counseling, and summer classroom gigs, this was my first big solo teaching job. And I wasn't much good at it.

My four classes were part of Newton's "curriculum II," which by twelfth grade meant that my students were mostly putting in time until they could grab their diplomas and head off to work, the army, or the nearby community college. Many of the boys were bigger, and nearly all of them tougher, than I. The

girls misbehaved less, but that didn't mean their minds were focused on the Problems of American Democracy course that I struggled to teach.

Chamber's longtime chief Paul Guzzi is ready to move on

Paul Guzzi said his new gig at Citi Performing Arts is "deeply personal," citing his relationship with An Wang.

It has been a long goodbye for Paul Guzzi, but the longtime president of the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce is really leaving.

His last day is Tuesday, and in fact, he's already packed.

"I happen to be a man without an office," said Guzzi, 73, who has been squatting in a conference room at the chamber's headquarters.

After 19 years at the helm, Guzzi cleared out of his office last week so it can be spruced up for the new guy, Jim Rooney, who is coming over after serving as executive director of the Massachusetts Convention Center Authority.

Guzzi wanted to bring along his mahogany desk — a gift to the chamber from the Federal Reserve Bank decades ago — but it was too big to move to his new office at the Citi Performing Arts Center.

That's where Guzzi plans to spend his retirement, working as the nonprofit's board chairman.

Before joining the chamber, Guzzi worked for Wang Laboratories and helped broker the company's \$6 million contribution to restore what is now the Citi Wang Theatre.

It was Dr. An Wang who gave Guzzi the chance to work in the private sector after being in politics.

"It's deeply personal," Guzzi said of his new gig. "I feel that I'm kind of giving back in a sense to him and to his family."

But first, Guzzi will take a rare summer off and head to his rustic cabin in Maine. He will play with his grandkids, catch up on reading, and train his year-old labradoodle, Alie. "She is not particularly obedient," Guzzi said. "If I don't come back with the dog trained, my wife will be upset."

Executive Profile: Robert Hurlbut of Cambridge Community Foundation

Robert Hurlbut has given new meaning to the term 'community resource'

On any given day, if you are in Cambridge, you might pass Bob Hurlbut as he walks the streets and has a first-hand look at what's happening in the city's neighborhoods.

Leo Harrington (husband of Carolyn Lukowicz Harrington)

Dick Crowley, known as "Coach" around Watertown for his many years of work with the recreation Department and Kids in Common' program recalls Leo Harrington from their joint service as the perfect Marine." Leo might also be called the perfect coach; and the two are not unrelated.

Indeed, Leo's formula for success both in life and on the field is based on his Marine Corps training. Championship teams, he notes, must have strong discipline, accountability for individual actions and a strong ethos of mutual responsibility. They must be motivated and intelligent. They must have an almost joyful morale grounded in real camaraderie. In short, the whole must add up to more than the sum of its parts.

Doing that math has been the crux of Leo's long career at Watertown High School. As of the 1999 season, he has served as assistant coach to the football team for thirty-one years. Over that time, he's seen four Middlesex League championship squads come and go. More than the wins and losses, though – and there have been a lot of both – Leo has had the chance to teach and mentor literally hundreds of student-athletes. Over time, his style has shifted to emphasize that part of his role. His coaching style at the outset belied his congenial manner, bearing a close resemblance to Parris Island drill instruction. But an assistant coach is unique, building relationships and bonding with players in a way sometimes denied the head coach. So while the military discipline remains – one can't learn without order he stresses – Leo's individual style of coaching is now truer to himself: teaching, building confidence, rapport, bringing out the very best in the athletes he works with. It's been a winning formula, and Leo has executed it superbly.

Leo's own athletic prowess lies at the heart of that success. Born and raised in Arlington, Leo went to Matignon High School and played football all four years before graduating in 1960. Clint Knight, a Matignon classmate and now executive director of the Watertown-Belmont Chamber of Commerce, recalls Leo as "truly talented and motivated – the best athlete of his class."

He had some great examples to look to in that regard. Leo recalls a memorable game against Watertown High in the fall of 1958, when fellow Hall inductee Bob Norton was a sophomore. Three things stood out. First, Matignon garnered twenty-one first downs to Watertown's one- but lost, 14-8. Second, there were no fewer than five future National Football League players on the field that day. For WHS, Bob Cappadona and Dave O'Brien suited up; for Matignon, the lineup included future Patriots Artie Graham and Don MacKinnon, along with Jack Concannon (later the Bears' number one draft pick).

Third, though, despite this array of talent, the best players on the field that day were Matignon QB Jackie Daley and star of the game Richie Green, who singlehandedly accounted for the Raiders' scoring by returning both a kickoff return and an intercepted pass for touchdowns.

After Matignon, Leo served in the Marine Corps reserves for six years, graduating from Boston State in 1969 with a degree in elementary education. He has worked in the Arlington Public Schools ever since, as an elementary physical education teacher and he has coached for even longer, returning to Matignon in 1964 to coach the freshman football team. In 1967 he became assistant varsity coach at Don Boscov in Boston; then, in 1969 he came to Watertown with new head coach John Barbati.

Watertown was coming off an 0-9 season. But over time the new staff rebuilt the program. Leo still remembers a small but crucial turning point: during a practice, Dom Lalli was blocking the pads held by Leo and, charged up, knocked Leo head over heels with a single vicious block. It lifted the practice and, Leo recalls, the team's whole attitude – suddenly Watertown's traditional toughness had returned. And four league championships (in 1973, 1976, 1977, and 1983) would follow. The Hall of Fame 1977 squad, led by Tom Tracy and Sparky Lyle, went 10-0, WHS's first undefeated and untied season

since 1918. In 1978, Leo was honored as the Massachusetts Assistant Football Coach of the Year by the Massachusetts High School Football Association.

A lot of memories spring from those years. Leo recalls that seeing Hall of Famers Orazio Lattanzi and Mark Reopening pitted against each other in practice was worth the price of game admission in itself. He won't name favorites – for a coach of his tenure that would be like picking a favorite child – but does admit that in all his time at WHS he has seen no finer athlete than three-sport star Cathy Guden. For his players' part, they are happy to have learned from one of the best. Lalli, for example, credits Leo with not only guiding his skills, but inspiring his confidence for getting him, and the team, to believe that they could succeed.

Over the years, Leo has also taken great pride in watching his wife, two daughters, and son take part in athletics. Indeed, his wife **Carolyn is a member of the Boston University and the Massachusetts High School Softball Coaches Halls of Fame in her own right.** Cindy, Kelly, and Mike, after yeoman service as “water people” for the WHS football squad in their younger years, went on to participate in high school and collegiate sports. The two girls were also part of the Lexington Gaels, a Junior Olympic women's softball team coached by Leo and named after his late sister who succumbed to breast cancer. The Gaels placed 17th in the national tournament, the best finish ever for a team from New England.

“Our parents are our first coaches,” Leo notes. “We always seem to get our best players when those first coaches did their job.” He's absolutely right, of course. It helps, though, to have other coaches do their jobs, too, and for over three decades Leo has done just that and more. It is that longstanding, and outstanding, service that the Hall is proud to honor this year.

Evanston Board Fires School Chief

In a close vote Wednesday, the board of Evanston School District 65 fired Supt. Eugene Mulcahy after he was arrested on a second drunken-driving charge. At an emotion-charged meeting, the board announced its 4-3 decision as many in the audience of about 50 hissed.

“The superintendent's employment and service to District 65 shall be terminated on July 22,” said board member Frederick Sinker, who voted in favor of firing Mulcahy.

Board President Walter Kihm, who voted against firing him, said the board would not comment further to protect Mulcahy's privacy.

The controversial decision was condemned by educators and parents who lauded Mulcahy's performance as superintendent since he was hired on a two-year contract in July, 1986.

Several parents who spoke during the hearing called for the board to help Mulcahy seek rehabilitation instead of firing him.

“Dr. Mulcahy may have a problem that may require treatment, but he has been able to reach out to this community,” said Judy Friedman, a parent of two children in the elementary school district.

“He was the first to suggest that we work together on our problems, and he was the first superintendent to point out the gap between black and white student test scores,” she said.

Mulcahy had earlier offered an apology to the district and the students after it was revealed Wednesday that he had been arrested on a drunken-driving charge last week. He had been convicted in New Jersey in 1983 on a similar charge.

In a statement, Mulcahy said, "I wish to especially tell my young friends how deep is my affection for them and how sad I am that I have made this mistake."

Mulcahy also said, "I am seeking professional help for the problem, which is at the root of this difficulty."

Mulcahy was not at the meeting and could not be reached for comment.

Audrey Foglin-Larson, president of the district's Educators' Council, said Mulcahy had the ability to solve problems with teachers "without the adversarial rhetoric."

Foglin-Larson, who asked to speak at the meeting as a citizen, said: "My father was killed in an accident by a drunk driver, so I do not easily dismiss this charge. But I believe in the ability of one turning himself around. I would have thought this district should have afforded him the chance because, in my estimation, Gene Mulcahy deserved it."

Mulcahy, 46, was arrested July 15 in the 1400 block of Chicago Avenue in the north suburb after officers said they saw him make several traffic violations. He failed a sobriety test and was charged with drunken driving, according to police.

Mulcahy also was charged with transportation of open liquor and other traffic violations. He is scheduled to appear in court Aug. 21.

The superintendent, described by Kihm as being on the "cutting edge of elementary education today," stirred controversy last year when he was hired after his drunken-driving conviction in New Jersey.

Mulcahy had been superintendent of a Teaneck, N.J., school district at the time, but he left the post before the school board there could decide his fate.

Mulcahy also caused controversy by living with a woman whom he had dated in New Jersey when he moved to Evanston.

Ann deBrau, president of the Evanston-Skokie Council of PTAs, defended Mulcahy before the announcement of his firing, saying his arrest should be used to help educate children on alcohol and substance abuse.

"He's brilliant," DeBrau said. "He has the greatest gift for working with children that I have ever seen in my life. I hope that the board exercises some wisdom by insisting that he seek treatment, help him recover from this and by helping the school district by keeping him here where he belongs."

Mulcahy had appealed the 1983 New Jersey conviction, but the New Jersey Supreme Court upheld the conviction in a June 30 ruling. Mulcahy now faces a \$250 fine in that case.

Mulcahy stirred up debate last September when he pointed to test results that showed a huge gap between white and black pupils' test scores. Mulcahy vowed to narrow the gap, which he called a "most profoundly disturbing trend."

Board members Cleopatra Alexander, Frederic Sinker, Helen McDermott and Lynda Arnell voted in favor of firing Mulcahy. Kihm and board members William Smith and Archibald Bryant voted against.

Fired school chief hired by academy

Eugene Mulcahy fired last summer as Evanston school superintendent after his arrest on drunken-driving charges was quietly hired Monday as 125-perday consultant to the Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy in Aurora

Academy Director Stephanie Marshall did not mention Mulcahy's drunken-driving arrest nor his 1983 conviction on charge in New Jersey when giving the school's board of trustees brief description of his qualifications for the consultant job

The only question was raised by Trustee Walter Massey who wanted to know if Mulcahy was local educator or if he had national experience

After Marshall outlined some of Mulcahy's achievements but omitted his firing by the Evanston school board the academy trustees unanimously approved his contract which is not to exceed 20 000

The state-funded academy is three-year residential school for teenagers gifted in technological skills

Asked why she had not told the board of Mulcahy's personal history Marshall said had discussed it with the board president James Pearson and nothing more needed to be said It's personal matter think it would be totally inappropriate to raise it

Mulcahy was fired in July by Evanston Elementary District 65 after Evanston police arrested him on drunken-driving charge

He had been convicted in 1983 in New Jersey on similar charge while superintendent in Teaneck

Mulcahy who has moved from his Evanston home to Chicago's North Side could not be reached for comment

Mulcahy said in statement after his dismissal that he was seeking professional help for the problem which is at the root of this difficulty

Mulcahy officially begins his academy consulting work Tuesday although he has already met with some staff and faculty members Marshall said

Mulcahy generated controversy but won widespread praise when he released figures in fall 1986 showing that Evanston's black students trailed their white counterparts badly in achievement test scores He said he wanted to make history by closing the gap

His duties at the academy will include coordinating the school's accelerated curriculum and focusing on goals in science instruction Marshall said

He will not be responsible for policy decisions

Marshall praised Mulcahy's extensive experience and his scholarship factors that she said greatly outweighed any concerns she had over his drunken-driving arrest and conviction

Some people might say 'She's taking big risk but others will say using an outstanding educational resource said Marshall who recruited Mulcahy

The reason I brought him here is that he is one of the finest people I know Marshall said He is connector of ideas and information

As consultant Mulcahy will not receive health insurance a pension or other benefits Marshall said

The position will expire when his work is finished which Marshall said would likely be by the end of the school year

The Evanston school board paid Mulcahy about 70 000 in severance pay to settle his two-year contract according to reports He made 78 000 in his only full year with District 65, and terms of his contract called for him to be paid 90 percent of that if he was dismissed

Bacon housemaster Helen Ryan worked in Newton High and in the old building until Bacon House was closed in 1981. She died October 8, 2008.

Tech secretary Donna Mandatori '67 worked in the Newton Public Schools for 39 years and died November 1, 2008.

Former English teacher and lacrosse coach Thomas DePeter died May 15, 2009. In memory of Mr. DePeter, this

After battling cancer, Latin teacher Robert Mitchell died May 27, 2009. Former English teacher and current Newton Teachers Association president Michael Zilles praised Mr. Mitchell as "the best high school teacher in the world."

Peter Cobb, music teacher and effervescent conductor of the Big N Tiger Marching Band, left Newton High in the late 1960s to pursue a doctorate degree at the University of Chicago. It was there that he met his future wife, Sharon, and together they moved to Connecticut where they both taught in the Wethersfield school system for many years.

Besides Newton — he attended NHS, and he and Sharon were married in Newton City Hall — Peter’s favorite place is Cape Cod. In 1988, he and Sharon bought the house in Orleans to which they retired 14 years later. They were avid collectors of such diverse items as circus memorabilia, marbles, antique clocks, books, and especially Christmas items. Their home featured a year-round “Christmas Room” filled with all manner of Christmas trees, nutcrackers, and Santa figurines. The centerpiece was a full-room mural of a Christmas scene featuring Peter and Sharon as children, painted from photographs by a noted Cape Cod artist.

Always in search of a baton, Peter served as conductor of the Harwich Town Band from 2006 to 2019. (Sharon, who passed away in 2019, played the bass drum.) Besides music, Peter’s loves through the years have included circuses, Nauset Beach, coffee ice cream, tap dancing, golden retrievers, barbershop quartet singing, chocolate, Tom Lehrer, his cat Ruby, Arnold’s Lobster & Clam Bar, Frank Lloyd Wright, beef, The Christmas Tree Shops, and whole belly fried clams.

Peter now lives under hospice care at Meadow Green Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Waltham. It’s not Newton, but it’s close.
